Coffee, one of the world's most widely consumed beverages, was not always so popular. At times a carefully guarded secret, at others a banned drink, it has spread from its place of origin in Ethiopia to every corner of the world.

According to legend, coffee was discovered in the 9th century by an Ethiopian goatherd. From Ethiopia coffee moved to Yemen, where it was cultivated for centuries before it arrived in Turkey in the 15th century. In Turkey the seeds were roasted and then mashed and mixed with water, creating a beverage similar to modern coffee.

Introduced to Europe in the 17th century thanks to Italian traders, coffee had sailed to India and Indonesia with Dutch merchants by the beginning of the 18th century. Coffee made its way to Brazil in 1727, hidden in a bouquet of flowers, and quickly spread throughout the rest of Latin America, and by 1823 had spread to Hawaii. In 1893 coffee returned home to Africa where **<u>it</u>** settled as a lucrative cash crop in Kenya and Tanzania. After almost a millennium of travelling, coffee had circumnavigated the globe.

Today, Brazil is the largest producer of this important commodity, harvesting more than 1 billion kilograms annually. Vietnam, which did not start growing coffee until 1914, is among the largest producers. Two types of coffee are produced worldwide, Arabica and Robusta. Arabica, which takes its name from its origins in the Arabian peninsula, accounts for three-quarters of world production and was once grown almost exclusively in South America. Robusta, which has a higher caffeine content, accounts for one quarter of Page 2 of 4

world production and is found mainly in Africa and Asia, where its hardiness can withstand a broader range of climates better than Arabica.

What makes you happier - a birthday present or a birthday party? New jeans or a day out with friends? There is a saying that money can't buy happiness. This idea is supported by economists who have found that as countries get richer, people living there do not necessarily become happier. Yet, by and large, most people would agree that if spent wisely, money can help in the pursuit of happiness. And if your funds are limited, then the question is how best to allocate them.

A logical assumption is that since material possessions last longer, purchasing things is wiser than spending money on one-off experiences, such as a trip or a concert. Research into the link between happiness and money, however, suggests the opposite is true. As Dr Thomas Gilovich, a professor of psychology at Cornell University, explains, "One of the enemies of happiness is what is called *adaptation*." In a study, people were asked to rank their happiness after making substantial material and experiential purchases. At first, happiness with both kinds of purchases was ranked equally. Gradually, however, people's satisfaction with items they had bought began to wane, whereas their appreciation of experiences they had spent money on intensified.

In the long run, an object which remains in your possession wouldn't make you as happy as an isolated experience. Yet the fact that the object is ever-present is the cause of eventual disenchantment. The more you become adapted to it, the more it fades into the background. Experiences, meanwhile, as long as they are significant, become part and parcel of your identity. Even those that were stressful or frightening at the time may later be viewed as character-building and therefore valuable.

Another reason you derive more happiness from experiences is that they are often shared with others in meaningful ways. You are more likely to form a lasting friendship with someone you went hiking with than someone who owns the same smartphone. Furthermore, people rarely make negative comparisons between their experiences and those of others, whereas with material possessions, they do so all the time, which inevitably leads to envy.

For many economists, happiness is the best indicator of the health of a society. Gilovich's research has important implications not only for your individual spending choices, but also for employers who want a content workforce - they could give more paid vacation instead of bonuses, for example. As for policy makers, Gilovich believes that "they can steer large populations to the kinds of experiential pursuits that promote greater happiness" by investing more in recreational facilities.
